Reuse and Cleanup Days – a New Season!



Central Contra Costa residents can take advantage of another season of convenient Reuse & Cleanup Days! Save yourself a trip to the thrift store and place unwanted, reusable items on the curb the day before a scheduled neighborhood cleanup. Pacific Rim Recycling will collect and distribute them to various organizations that reuse, resell or donate to those in need. Detailed information will be mailed to you about two weeks prior to your collection day. See the list below for a general collection schedule.

In past years, bicycles and sporting equipment were sent overseas to countries such as Bosnia and Peru. A Closer Look at Collection Rates

Many CCCSWA customers may have noticed a rate adjustment on the March bill. Rate adjustments are a result of an independent review process, and are part of a 10-year service agreement for garbage and recycling collection.

In March 1996, the CCCSWA negotiated lower rates and enhanced services for its member agencies. Since then, there have been two reviews and annual CPI rate increases in some communities; and new programs such as curbside reuse collection, recycling-only cleanups, yard-waste drop-off, electronics collection events and small business recycling have been added. Even with these additional benefits and an overall CCCSWA average rate increase of 3% per year, rates remain well below 1996 levels.

During the review process, a consultant examines service costs and recommends rate adjustments based on several factors such as the consumer, producer and motor fuel price indices. Rates and increases are also dependent on your community (i.e. how hilly, number of narrow private roads, distance from final destination, and the ratio of business, multi-family and residential accounts). A public hearing is held at the January CCCSWA board meeting. Rates effective March 1 are posted on our website at www.waste.diversion.org.

The CCCSWA awarded funds to the following two projects that will increase waste reduction and recycling in the CCCSWA service area.

CARRY YOUR CONSERVATION HABITS TO THE GREAT OUTDOORS

Pack a Zero Waste Picnic

Reuse and recycling may start at home, but you can easily carry your conservation habits into the outdoors for a zero-waste picnic. Here are a few tips on Earth-friendly picnicking:

Create your own reusable picnic set. A wine stain may keep a cloth from your Thanksgiving table, but it could find new life at a casual picnic, on the table or grass.



It's easy to create an inexpensive reusable picnic set. Combine reuse with recycling and composting, and you can enjoy good food in the great outdoors ... with ZERO WASTE!

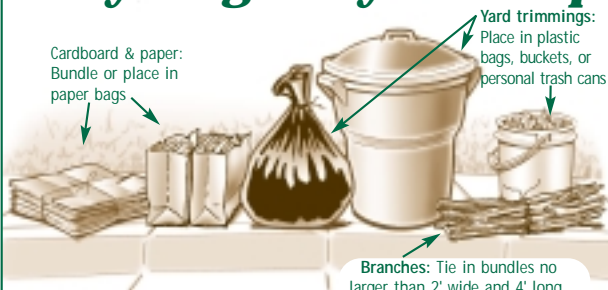
Pass over paper napkins and towels for the real deal in cloth. Resale stores are great resources for inexpensive plastic reusable mugs, wine glasses, plates, tablecloths, cloth napkins and flatware. Store all your picnic gear in a large basket or cooler and you'll be ready for sun, fun and food at a moment's notice.

Use the cooler to keep your food fresh and healthy before and after your meal. (Avoid disposable Styrofoam coolers.) The night before the picnic, fill old plastic bottles with drinking water and freeze. Stash them in the cooler the next day to keep everything cold, or use special reusable freezer packs designed for this purpose.

Pack sandwiches and other treats in reusable food storage containers. You can also use Ziploc bags that can be washed and reused. Bring drinks in a Thermos or buy recyclable containers such as aluminum cans, glass or plastic bottles. Be sure to recycle cans and bottles at the park, or bring them home to recycle in your burgundy cart.

A zero waste picnic means there is no need for the garbage can. To successfully avoid trips to the trash, remember to pack out what you pack in. Reuse or recycle all containers, reuse plastic bags, and use food containers to store food scraps so you can add them to your worm or compost bin at home.

How to Use Your FREE Recycling-Only Cleanup



As part of regular collection service, Central Contra Costa residents are allowed unlimited recycling-only cleanups from Valley Waste Management (VWM). These cleanups are in addition to the two scheduled and one on-call garbage cleanups offered by Pleasant Hill Bayshore Disposal.

For recycling-only cleanups, acceptable materials include yard trimmings, cardboard and paper. Recycling is the perfect way to clean up after an extensive landscaping project, recent move or household file update. Follow the guidelines below and call 935-8900 to schedule your pickup.

Total amount of material allowed per pickup: two cubic yards (the equivalent of 14 32-gallon bags).

Cardboard: Break down and put in bundles no larger than 18" x 18".

Paper: Put in brown paper bags or boxes, or bundle using rope or twine.

Branches: Must be no larger than 2" in diameter. Put in bundles no larger than 2' wide and 4' long.

Loose yard clippings such as leaves and grass: Place in plastic bags, buckets, boxes or personal trash cans. No more than 32 gallons per bag, box or container.

Not accepted: garbage, ash, dirt, rocks, glass, metal, fruit or vegetables, cactus, ivy, ice plant, palm, poison oak or poison ivy.

Ask the Authority

Dear Authority,

To reduce waste, I followed your recent suggestion and began reusing preprinted response envelopes from junk mail solicitations for my own purposes. I've discovered, however, that crossing out the existing address or placing a new label over it is not enough. Check for barcodes and cover those as well. I learned the hard way after my mail was returned from a business.

Learning in Lafayette

Dear Learning,

We salute your thorough efforts to reduce waste. Unfortunately, as you discovered, U.S. Post Office automation systems read the barcodes on an envelope to identify the recipient address. This barcoded address information takes precedence over handwritten or preprinted addresses. As you suggested, to reuse these envelopes, place a label over the barcoded area in addition to the address area or cross out the barcode with a dark black marker. This should prevent any misdelivery.

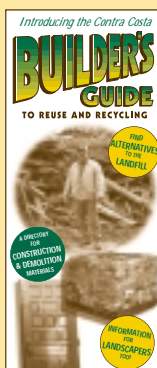
Remodeling?

Work with your contractor to recycle and reuse your remodeling waste.

Be a waste-savvy consumer and ask for your contractor's plans to dispose of the debris generated by your upcoming remodeling project. Many reuse and recycling opportunities exist for brick, tile, asphalt, concrete, windows, doors, fixtures, cabinets and more. In fact, the City of Walnut Creek already requires a recycling plan for construction or remodeling projects greater than \$50,000 or 5,000 square feet.

Even if your project is smaller than this, you can help Central Contra Costa reach its waste reduction goal and save money by recycling your construction & demolition (C&D) debris. Recycling is cheaper than disposal and the savings could be passed on to you. C&D debris comprised 20% of the material businesses recycled last year in Central Contra Costa, up from 6% two years ago.
